1949 SFF – The Big Picture

Dave Hook's favorites for 1949 SFF, with links to his essays on each area. He will update this after the panel or Worldcon.

Novels (see link to full essay): I read, or considered reading, 19 novels published in 1949. My favorites were the two classics, *Nineteen Eighty-Four* by George Orwell, Secker & Warburg/Harcourt, Brace & Company, *Earth Abides* by George R. Stewart, Random House/Gollancz, and the superlative *What Mad Universe*, Fredric Brown, E. P. Dutton. I recommend all of these.

Short Fiction (see link to full essay): My favorites include superlative short stories "The Long Watch", by Robert A. Heinlein, and "The Martian" (AKA "Impossible"), of The Martian Chronicles, by Ray Bradbury, superlative novelettes "Opening Doors", by Wilmar H. Shiras, and "The Witches of Karres", by James H. Schmitz, along with the great novellas "Agent of Vega", by James H. Schmitz, and "The Lion of Comarre", by Arthur C. Clarke. Hidden Gems include a first story, "In the Days of Our Fathers", a short story by Winona McClintic, from the first issue of F&SF, and "The NRACP", a horrific novelette by George Elliott.

Anthologies (see link to full essay): My favorites are the first Best Of the Year anthology, <u>The Best Science Fiction Stories: 1949</u>, Everett F. Bleiler & T. E. Dikty editors, 1949 Frederick Fell, and the first original anthology of speculative fiction, <u>The Girl With the Hungry Eyes, and Other Stories</u>, Donald A. Wollheim editor, 1949 Avon. I recommend them both, although getting ahold of them has challenges.

Collections (see link to full essay): My favorites are *The Thirty-First of February*, by Nelson S. Bond, 1949 Gnome Press, and *The Wheels of Ir, and Other Science Fiction*, by L. Sprague de Camp, 1949 Shasta, both rated at "Very good", and *The Fox Woman and Other Stories*, A. Merritt, 1949 Avon Publishing Co., rounded up to "Very good". Although none of them got to "Great", I recommend these three.
